Benefits of light rail

- light rail is fast, frequent, comfortable and quiet
- each service can replace four buses
- opens up Randwick for Sydney visitors
- · frees up onstreet parking for local residents
- light rail can move 12,000 people per hour compared with 3,500 on buses (source Metro Transport)
- provides a direct rail line for UNSW
- more customers for Randwick and Kensington businesses
- no net parking loss in Randwick Town Centre
- will help transport 4,000 new education, research and health workers expected in Randwick by 2030

Working together

Randwick Council, UNSW and the Australian Turf Club are co-funding a pre-feasibility study into light rail to examine potential routes, preliminary costings, financial viability and patronage.

Council has signed a Memorandum of Understanding supporting the extension of light rail to Randwick with UNSW, the Australian Turf Club, South East Sydney Local Health Network and The Centennial Park and Moore Park Trust.

Randwick Council is also working closely with City of Sydney to connect the light rail route into central Sydney.

Light rail to Randwick

Modern cities around the world embrace light rail as a better way of moving people around inner city areas. Randwick City Council is working with the University of New South Wales, four Randwick hospitals, Centennial Park and Moore Park Trust and the Australian Turf Club to lobby the State Government to extend light rail to Randwick.

Current situation

- Anzac Parade is one of Sydney's busiest transport corridors
- buses remain the sole public transport option to Randwick City
- 25 million trips are made between the Sydney City Centre and Randwick each year
- the area contains Sydney's highest concentration of employment, education, health, event and recreation destinations
- 11,000 Randwick City residents commute to central Sydney every workday
- buses travelling between Randwick and the Sydney City Centre are full in both directions during peak
- 42,000 students attend UNSW
- 13,200 people work at local hospitals and UNSW
- 400,000 people attend races at Royal Randwick Racecourse each year
- 1.1 million people watch games at the SCG and SFS
- 1 million people go to concerts, events and exhibitions at Fox Studios, Hordern Pavilion, Centennial Park and Royal Randwick
- 1.3 million visitors access health services and hospitals in Randwick each year
- 7,000 people study at Randwick TAFE
- 10 million visitors go to Centennial Park and Moore Park each year
- lack of public transport results in students, workers and hospital visitors parking on residential streets
- 4,500 children attend 15 schools across Randwick, Kingsford and Kensington
