Light rail fast facts

- 20 stops from Circular Quay to Kingsford and Randwick
- Can carry up to 9,000 people per hour in each direction
- 5 minutes from Moore Park to Central Station
- 15 minute journey from Central Station to Circular Quay
- A maximum of 24 minutes from Kingsford or Randwick to Central Station
- A 'turn up and go' service
- Real time travel information at stops and on light rail vehicles
- Integrated with the Opal ticketing system.

Planning update

The CBD and South East Light Rail (CSELR) is a unique project that will transform Sydney.

An Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) for the project is being prepared to satisfy planning approval requirements of Part 5.1 of the Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979.

The EIS will include:

- Background information, including the need for the project, its strategic context and the alternatives considered.
- A description of the design and construction plan.
- An assessment of the potential environmental impacts.
- Recommended measures proposed to minimise and manage potential environmental impacts.
- A commitment to further assess specific issues during the next stages of the project.

The EIS will be on public exhibition in late 2013. We will be actively consulting with the community about the project through information sessions advertised in this brochure. The community will also be encouraged to make a formal submission to the Department of Planning and Infrastructure when the EIS goes on public exhibition.

Works underway

Transport for NSW is currently undertaking early investigations, including geotechnical, utility, traffic and access surveys, to help inform the design and planning work for the project. These works will be localised and may require minor traffic diversions, night time works in the CBD and potentially both day/night works in other areas.



The planning process

Stage 1 - Environmental Impact Statement

- State Significant Infrastructure (SSI) application lodged with Department of Planning and Infrastructure
- Department of Planning and Infrastructure issues Director-General's Requirements for the EIS
- Community information sessions are held along the route; an opportunity for the community to have their say
- The EIS is being prepared

We are here

Stage 2 - Exhibition, public consultation and review

- Public exhibition of the EIS - and another chance for the community to have their say by making a formal submission on the EIS
- Submissions Report responding to issues raised during the public exhibition period is prepared
- Transport for NSW will submit a Preferred Infrastructure Report outlining proposed changes to minimise environmental impacts identified in the EIS and public submissions, if required

Have your say

Stage 3 - Assessment and Determination

- Department of Planning and Infrastructure consults with Government agencies and councils and prepares draft Director-General's report outlining recommended conditions for approval or refusal
- Director-General's report with recommendations submitted to Minister for Planning and Infrastructure
- Decision by Minister for Planning and Infrastructure
